- 02/17/2018 | H L Hunley Commemorative Station N4HLH Feb 17, 1400Z-2000Z, N4HLH, North Charleston, SC. Trident Amateur Radio Club.
- 02/19/2018 | George Washington's Birthday Feb 19, 0000Z-2359Z, WS7G, Moses Lake, WA..
- 02/23/2018 | Faces of the Florizel Feb 23-Feb 24, 1100Z-2000Z, VO1MZL, St. John's, NL. Society of Newfoundland Radio Amateurs. This takes place at the Admirality House Communications Museum in New Foundland. Background On February 23, 1918 the SS Florizel left St. John's, NL for what would be its final journey. What was supposed to be a routine trip from St. John's to Halifax and then to New York ended in tragedy. Blizzard conditions and miscommunication between the bridge and the engine room caused the vessel to crash into the rocks near Cappahayden, Newfoundland. Of the 137 souls on board, only

44 survived. 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the wreck.

- 02/24/2018 | Hastings Naval Depot 75th Anniversary Feb 24, 1500Z-2100Z, W0WWV, Wood River, NE. ARAN. The Naval Ammunition Depot is 75 years old and produced 40% of all naval munitions for the Second World War and the Korean War.
- 02/24/2018 | Heinrich Hertz Birthday Feb 24, 1600Z-2200Z, W4NRC, Germantown, TN. Nashoba Amateur Radio Club. I'm embarrassed to say that I never knew where the term "hertz" came from.
- 02/28/2018 | Snow Bird Field Day Feb 28, 1400Z-2300Z, W7ASL, Mesa, AZ. Sunlife & Venture Out Ham Radio Clubs. This might be a good event to help us live vicariously!

Wisconsin QSO Party

Sunday, March 11, 2018; 1:00PM to 8:00PM CDST

Forty years! Our West Allis Radio Amateur Club has been sponsoring the Wisconsin QSO Party since 1979 and that's forty years! Let's be proud of that and show it by being on the air on March 11. And be sure to proudly mention that you are a member of the sponsoring club.

Our QSO Party is an on-the-air operating event that remains popular with stations in Wisconsin, across the country and the world. A unique thing about WIQP is that there's something for everyone, from biggun contesters as well as more casual little pistols.

Much of the focus of QSO parties is on mobile operation and WIQP is no exception. Since Wisconsin counties are multipliers in the scoring, there is a strong incentive to get all counties on the air. And since there are many counties that have few local hams, the only activation is by mobiles that travel from county to county. See details on our webpage at http://www.warac.org/wqp/activate.htm.

So mobile operation is a big piece of WIQP. In 2017, forty percent (29) of our 72 counties were activated only by mobiles – no fixed stations. Only two counties had no QSO's by mobiles.

It's not surprising that much of the mobile operation is on CW. There are two main reasons. CW is simply more effective for low-power stations with poor antennas. It's much easier for a CW mobile to hold a frequency than a phone mobile. The other reason is that CW QSO's count two points, a long standing incentive to encourage CW activity.

Operating on CW in a moving vehicle is a challenge, not to mention the planning and personal resources that are needed to drive through 10 or more counties in a seven-hour period. Hats off to the mobile stations that come out for WIOP.

But CW operation isn't for everybody. One of the strengths of WIQP is that there is something for everybody. There is lots of activity on the phone bands, too, as well as on VHF. Many stations just get on the air to enjoy casual QSOing. And remember that the overall goal is for everyone to have fun.

So we want everyone! The more stations participating, the more QSO's will be made, and that makes it more fun. Be sure to read the Rules, get on the air and **join the party on Sunday, March 11** - 1:00 PM to 8:00PM.

At the upcoming meeting we'll talk about the in's and out's of the QSO Party, with information about county activation as well as strategy and logging software.

Any and all questions are fair game. If you have something you're wondering about, please bring it

up! Meanwhile, please visit the WIQP website at http://www.warac.org/wqp/wqp.htm.


So please make plans to be on the air – Sunday, March 11. Just seven hours of fun!

DX: Nothing is a bigger let down than the cancelled Bouvet 3Y0Z event. Canceled literally on arrival at the island. That has to hurt. The rest of the planned events are more typical. There seems to be an African DX push of late with C5DX being the next up. The good news is smaller events make for smaller pileups. And don't forget to scout FT8. That is a great way to bag ATNO's the easy way.



<u>Contests:</u> We are in prime contest season RIGHT NOW. The Dutch PACC contest is neat because every entry receives a Participation Token. One QSO is all it takes. I'm not competitive in the DX contests, but always make a few contacts. Also the Carolina contests are pretty neat as South Carolina is on Sat and North Carolina is on Sunday. For those two, if 20 meters is working, then you can do well, otherwise it is a function of waiting out the contacts on 40/80. Working QSO party events as out of state entries makes you appreciate how many mobiles are involved in the WI QSO Party. Mobiles make the QP contests fun to work and not many states field as many mobiles as WI.


Bruce Kelley 1929'r By Mike Johnson, WO9B

What is a Bruce Kelley? 1929'r? What madness is this? All good questions and for those who are goal/project afflicted like myself, it is best described as my latest Grail Quest.

Somewhere in the last couple of years I stumbled on this crazy operating event called the Bruce Kelley 1929 QSO Party. The event is sponsored by the Antique Wireless Association (AWA) and takes place in December over two weekends. The goal is to make contacts with stations running low power transmitters, home built, which use designs and tubes available in 1929 or earlier. This past December, I listened to these guys on 80 meters making a bunch of contacts. You can't miss the signals, they are very distinctive. Chirpy, drifting, unsteady tones....Geez it was amazing. So amazing that I absolutely need to get in the game. So by this December, I'm gonna have me one of them that 1929'rs. The Grail Quest has begun.

There is one really big problem: I don't know much of anything about building transmitters with tubes, much less anything electronic beyond the very very basics. The good news is the AWA certainly does and offers up enough to get me started. Long story short, and you can read more on their site or as they say "Google is your friend", I've decided on the easiest transmitter for the contest, the Hartley Oscillator. Remember those from ham exams past?



That's the goal. And I've added one other rule to the game. It's simple and that is the parts need to be scrounged from friends, part stashes, swap fests and the like. The exception being "special" parts that give me few options besides Mouser. I've already run into a problem with the power supply, but that story will have to wait until next month. In the meantime, let the scrounge begin!!
