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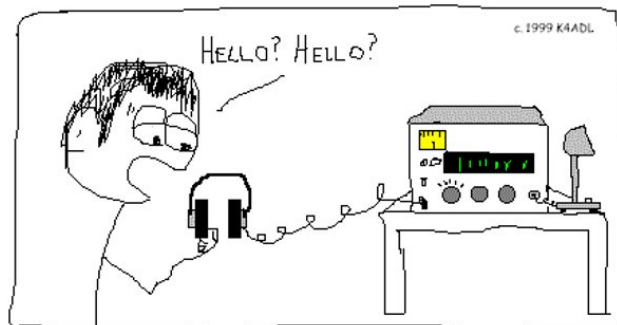

Field Day 2013

Thanks to everyone who participated in Field Day this year. It was great to see many of the new WARAC members at Field Day this year. The club had a very successful event and everyone is to be commended. West Allis Radio Amateur Club ran in the 2A class, with station configurations similar to last year.

It is fortunate that Mother Nature cooperated because it was not looking good on Saturday morning. With the equipment and antenna gear loaded, the crew was off to the site to set up. While en route through rain, a quick QSO on 14.290 (Milwaukee/Florida Net) proved equally disturbing--the band was barely open. The only Q5 stations heard were locals, George, AA9SR and Gene, W9RYT. Was this going to be a good radio weekend?

As the crew arrived at the site, the weather broke and allowed us to get in the field. The field was very wet from heavy rain the night before and a few arrived with waders; good planning on their part! Setup was completed in record time this year, clearly a benefit from our ongoing simplification efforts. By 1600z, two hours ahead of schedule, the two HF stations were on the air and had made a few test QSOs. Field Day was coming together; a break in the weather, improved propagation, and an uncomplicated setup were just what we needed to make it a good radio weekend!

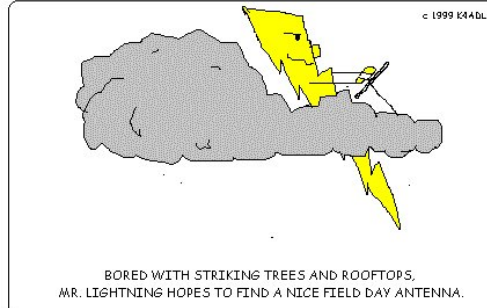
Antennas this year consisted of two dipoles and two Yagis. The 80/20/10 meter station ran all three bands on an 80 meter flat top dipole fed with ladder line. Support for the antenna was mast less, using trees on each end with a nominal height of about 50 feet. The 40/15 meter station used an Alpha Delta DXCC multi-band dipole in a flat top configuration with a single 40 foot mast and a tree as supports. The VHF station ran Yagis for 6 and 2 meters on a single rotatable mast.

Last year's experiment with the N1MM logging program continues to evolve with both HF stations using N1MM this year. Initially employed to take advantage of its robustness with digital Qs, N1MM may be adopted solely in the future.

Total contacts were 875 this year, down 9% over last year. 80 meters did not prove to be a good Field Day band due to significant regional thunderstorms. There were challenging conditions on Saturday night and Sunday morning, making Qs difficult amongst the QRN. Had 80 meters been in better shape, we would have likely surpassed last year's total. 6 meters proved to be slightly stronger this year, up to 85 Qs from last year's 39. This is still a very different band from 2011, where 245 Qs were logged, making it the strongest contributor that year.

40 meters was the strongest band this year. Conditions were very good with most of the search and pounce QSOs requiring a single call. Though the band was just as busy as last year, it seemed a bit easier to pull out the desired stations. 20 meters performed well and was right on the heels of 40, with 6 and 15 meters contributing modestly. 80 and 10 meters were disappointing and we had just one honorary 2 meter contact. Our Phone/CW split remains about the same as last year, 55% Phone to 45% CW. Due to the excellent conditions on 40 meters, there was a change in plan, abandoning any digital efforts. The QSO rates remained very good on 40, so it made better sense to continue to work the Phone and CW Qs.

Tornado safty tips

Tornadoes are one of nature's most powerful and destructive forces. Here's some advice on how to prepare for a tornado and what to do if you're caught in a twister's path.

Safety Tips

- Prepare for tornadoes by gathering emergency supplies including food, water, medications, batteries, flashlights, important documents, road maps, and a full tank of gasoline.
- When a tornado approaches, anyone in its path should take shelter indoors—preferably in a basement or an interior first-floor room or hallway.
- Avoid windows and seek additional protection by getting underneath large, solid pieces of furniture.
- Avoid automobiles and mobile homes, which provide almost no protection from tornadoes.
- Those caught outside should lie flat in a depression or on other low ground and wait for the storm to pass.
